The Manu canopy tower enabled us to get to birds that otherwise would be virtually inaccessible. Our trip to Machu Picchu and Abra Malaga added many birds to the list we did not see in Manu. We saw a great variety of birds as we expected. Lois and Richard left us after Amazonia Lodge Bill Sterling after Puerto Maldonado. A Wonderful trip.

DAY BY DAY ACTIVITIES

July 22: Everyone arrives in Lima

July 23: A full day along the coast south of Lima to the fishing village of Pucusana and a short boat trip, and in the afternoon to the Villa Marshes.

July 24: Morning flight to Cusco and out to Hucarpay lakes with picnic lunch. Overnight in Cusco at Hotel Los Andes de America

July 25: Cusco (3300 meters) to Pillahuata (Esperanza) camp (2910 meters) with stops at Paucartambo, Huancarani and Acjanacu pass (3530 meters).

July 26: A full days birding in the Esperanza/Pillahuata area around 3000 meters. In the morning to the Toneless and Pillahuata Stations; in the afternoon to the Upper part of the Camp.

July 27: Started birding at Pillahuata (2600 meters) down to Rocotal (2010 meters). A little bit of rain in the afternoon and night at Cock of the Rock Lodge.

July 28: Full day at Cock of the Rock Lodge. In the early morning to the Platform for the AndeanCock of the Rock and after breakfast we just went around the Lodge and in the afternoon just a Little bit further up. Night Cock of the Rock Lodge.

July 29: Full day in the Cock of the Rock Lodge area birding from Rocotal (2010 meters) to the Lodge (1300 mts). Night Cock of the Rock Lodge.

July 30: Cock of the Rock Lodge to Amazonia Lodge. We birded from the Lodge lower down to 1000 meters (Quita Calzones). We stopped at the Patria where we saw some Seedeaters (660 meters), drove thru Pillcopata where we stopped for a telephone call then onto Atalaya with a stop at the Mirador, and then we crossed the Alto Madre de Dios River and walked into Amazonia Lodge. Night Amazonia Lodge

July 31: We crossed the river in the early morning to be at the Macaw overlook (800 meters) early. We then birded the Atalaya - Pilcopata road and returned to Amazonia Lodge for lunch. Afternoon was spent on the jeep track. Night Amazonia Lodge.

August 01: Morning on the hill trails above Amazonia Lodge to about 700 meters including the canopy tower. Afternoon on trails near the lodge. Night Amazonia Lodge.

August 02: We spent all day around the trail system of the lowland part of the Amazonia Lodge.

August 03: Early morning to the river and by boat to Manu Wildlife Center Lodge (250 meters). Night Manu Wildlife Center Lodge.

August 04: In the early morning we went to the Blanquillo Macaw Clay Lick and in the afternoon we went to the Creekside trail.

August 05: We went to Cocha Camungo in the Morning but we just went to the Tower and a quick look to the Camungo Lake only from the shore, before going back to the boat. Afternoon to the Grid.

August 06: Cocha Blnco in the Morning where we had a good look of the River otters and in the afternoon to Cocha Camungo to the Lake itself.

August 07: All morning in the Bamboo patch on the Cocha Nueva trail. Afternoon on Quetzal trail. Night Manu Wildlife Center Lodge.

August 08: Creek side trail in the morning and in the afternoon to the Mammal like where we saw 3 tapirs at the lick itself and we heard two more on the trail on the owling walk, where we saw the very nice Long tailed Potoo.

August 09: We birded in our way back from the Mammal lick to the Lodge all the morning on the "Tapir Trail".

August 10: Early start and we went down the Madre de Dios River for 8 hours to Laberinto where we took a bus to Puerto Maldonado. We spend overnight at Cabana Quinta Hotel.

August 11: Morning birding around Km 15 outside Puerto Maldonado. Early afternoon flights to Cusco, and overnight at Ollantaytambo "sacred valley" at Pakaritampu hotel.

August 12: We birded around the Sacred Valley all day.

August 13: We went in to Abra Malaga area and we birded by the bamboo pach in the morning basically at the other side of the pass. In the afternoon we worked our way back to the Hotel birding along the way.

August 14: We spent almost the all day in the Polylepis woodlands looking for the Polylepis forest specialists.

August 15: We went from Sacred Valley to Machu-Picchu and Machu-Picchu Touring in the morning and after lunch we went back up for the Inca Wren where we actually we had great look of 2 of them, and in the afternoon shortly birding on our way back to Aguas Caliente and overnight at Machu-Picchu Inn Hotel.

August 16: Birding morning at Machu-Picchu Pueblo Hotel for few hours and then we birded along Aguas Caliente road on the way up to Machu-picchu, afternoon along the train track. After that in the afternoon we took our train back to Cusco at 5:30 pm.
