Plain breasted Hawk **Accipiter ventralis**

Sensational close views of one member of a pair hunting almost at ground level in the thickets along the road below Acjanacu Guard station

Slate-coloured Hawk **Leucopternis schistacea**

One seen perched momentarily in the understorey at MWC

Bay-winged Hawk **Parabuteo unicinctus**

One seen at Santa Eulalia

Black-chested Buzzard Eagle **Geranoaetus melanoleucus**

Great views along the Manu road and other localities during the tour

Roadside Hawk **Buteo magnirostris**

Variable Hawk **Buteo polysoma**

Several sightings during the tour. Taxonomy for this “group” is a little confusing and a recent publication has again proposed to split this into *Puna* and *Red-backed Hawks*. However, the data presented is poor and recent genetic data are consistent with the earlier hypothesis that both forms are conspecific. No vocal differences exist between the forms and apparent differences in wing formula represent an elevational cline. Lump ‘em folks!

Harpy Eagle **Near threatened** **Harpia harpyja**

I just remember the stunned, disbelieving hesitation from us all to call it as this monstrous thing came flying from one side of the Rio Mdre de Dios to the other, in front of the boat, as we almost reached MWC. We all knew what it was, and both Andy and Gary had cameras ready and snapped it as it seemed to take an age to get across the river and perch in Gynerium cane on the river bank. Unfortunately it took off before we came alongside it, but ... wellwhat can you say. Some of the best looks at this thing that I have ever had.

Crested Eagle **Near Threatened** **Morphnus guianensis**

And then this happened! In Manu anyhow, you never get to see “both eagles” ... never. Then, two days after we saw the Harpy, whilst we birded the old floodplain forest along the grid at MWC I spotted an adult Crested Eagle, perched 5m from the ground in the understorey. Everyone got on it and again, Andy and Gary nailed it with photos before it took off through the mid-storey. This thing

was no doubt tracking the large troop of White-fronted Capuchins that seasonally descend upon the forest around the grid system at Manu Wildlife Centre in a large feeding frenzy, and whenever they do, you always have a good chance of seeing either of “the eagles” or Ornate Hawk-Eagle. Again, the best looks I have ever had of the species in Peru. We stopped birding for the day at that point and headed back to the lodge to chug down several ice-cold ones because, quite frankly, how on earth can you beat that? I think I’ll frame page four of the checklist...Monster-monster-monster!!!!

The SACC says: “As noted by Ridgely & Greenfield (2001), evidence for species rank for the four species of *Pipile* is weak, and various authors have used just about every possible permutation of species limits” Many authors continue to treat them as a single species, *Pipile pipile* ("Common Piping-Guan"), whereas others consider all four major groups as separate species, the treatment followed here.

The famous DSP! Stunning close quarter views at our usual spot at Marcapomoacochoa. Rare throughout its range, this species is threatened by over-grazing, mining, and more recently, habitat destruction caused by people removing the top soil for cultivation of edible mushrooms for Lima restaurants.

Common at Pantanos de Ventanilla. Taxonomy is a bit confusing. The SACC says "*Himantopus mexicanus* was formerly considered a subspecies of Old World *H. himantopus* ("Common Stilt"). Some authors have treated southern South American *melanurus* as a separate species. The six taxa in the genus *Himantopus* form a near-globally distributed superspecies and between one to six species-level taxa recognized by various authors. Virtually no data are available relevant to taxon-ranking of allopatric populations. The contact between *mexicanus* and *melanurus* in South America, where at least some hybridization occurs, affords one of the best opportunities for such study.

Reasons for its decline are not clear but an increase in numbers caught for the pet-trade is a major contributory factor.
