

NATIONAL AUDUBON SOCIETY PERU BIRDING EXPERIENCE MANU 2007

One of the great delights that this trip brought was birding across the southern Andes this time of the year with still everything green from the rainy season but clear skies and great visibility that allowed us to see many beautiful snow-capped mountains. We really enjoyed the team's performance, everybody spotting and describing birds, this helped everybody to have great views of most of the species we saw. The locations that were visited allowed everybody to understand better the dynamics of most of the life zones we visited. We had some fantastic highlights such as finding about one hundred Peruvian Thicknees south from Lima!, a male Lyre-tailed Nightjar perched by the road near the overlook above Cock of the Rock Lodge, three different species of colorful Cotingas in one tree at Manu Wildlife Centre and an Army-Ant Swarm at the bamboo trail of Cocha Nueva where many antbirds were just working around taking advantage of the insects that were flushed by these carnivorous ants, just to name a few special experiences. A total list of exactly 400 bird species seen for the whole trip, probably the most exciting non-bird sighting was four species of monkeys seen on one afternoon. The weather in general behaved pretty well. We were caught by a cold front as we drove to the Manu Cloud forest and apart from no activity of Cock of the Rocks at the lek everything worked fine.

Itinerary

May 5th

We drove south from Lima to our first stop at Villa Marshes, after this we stopped at the San Pedro Fields and after a short walk in the abandoned fields we walked to the beach and small lagoon on the northern shore. We then drove to Pucusana bay and took a local fisherman's boat in which we navigated around the main island enjoying the seabird colonies and searching for Humboldt Penguins. Once we reached land we went above the overlook where we finally found about eight penguins torpedoing away into the clear green seas. A last stop in the Lurin fields where we found large concentrations of Thickknees. Overnight at Hotel Señorial-Lima.

May 6th

Early morning flight to Cusco. After Hotel registration and some Coca leaf tea we drove south to the Huacarpay Lakes complex where we spent the rest of the day birding the shallow marshes, reed beds, deeper lagoons and the arid montane scrub that surrounds the area. Overnight at Hotel Andes de America-Cusco.

May 7th

Another early departure, this time to catch the comfortable train to Machu Picchu, enjoy the scenery and look for Torrent Ducks and White-capped Dippers along the Urubamba river. As we arrived we went straight to the citadel. Guided Tour with Sonia and after a varied and tasty buffet lunch went looking for the endemic Inca Wren. A quiet in the shuttle bus marked the end of an almost dream-like day. Overnight at Hotel Machu Picchu Inn.

May 8th

After breakfast we walked the road along the Urubamba river *en route* to Machu Picchu. Our first encounter with mixed species flocks drove everybody crazy (some from satisfaction some from

frustration). An interesting approach to what is technically known as “Interespecific Mutualism”. After finding some rarities such as Maroon-chested Ground-dove it was time for lunch and then we had a nice journey back to Cusco that included a fashion show. Overnight at Hotel Andes de America.

May 9th

A very interesting day of drive across the eastern slope of the Andes that took us through the interandean valleys, puna grasslands and elfin forests into the cloud covered montane forests of the Manu Biosphere Reserve. Some stops along the way in specially chosen localities such as Huancarani, Acjanaco and Pillahuata provided a nice sample of the Andean birdlife present in this biogeographical region. Overnight at Cock of the Rock Lodge.

May 10th

Early morning visit to the nearby Lek to look for Cock of the Rocks. After breakfast that was interrupted many times by the continuous sightings we birded extensively from the lodge’s deck. A late morning walk to the San Pedro bridge, allowed the group to have a view of a Golden-headed Quetzal crossing the river. After lunch and some rest we drove to the overlook and after some nice views of the landscape we found a perched Lyre-tailed Nightjar, an amazing sighting. Overnight at Cock of the Rock Lodge.

May 11th

After an early breakfast we drove almost straight downhill with a short stop at the town of Pilcopata and then we took our dugout canoes at the port of Atalaya. After some hours of navigation, that included a small incursion into the waters of the Manu river, (with an ocelot sighting included), we reloaded fuel at Boca Manu and continue to Manu Wildlife Centre. Interesting river margin birds along the way. Overnight Manu Wildlife Center

May 12th

Early departure to Blanquillo Clay Lick where we had an incredible morning with an astonishing number of parrots in the area including more than one hundred Red and Green Macaws from which we had at least forty eating clay at the same time on the river bank. A whole set of new birds from the willow bars and islands was added to the trip list. A great afternoon birding the lodge clearing, allowing the group to stay together enjoying birds. Overnight Manu Wildlife Center

May 13th

This morning we visited the lodge’s canopy platform located within the trail system. A good introduction to canopy birds included good views of Scaly-breasted and Cream-colored Woodpeckers. After this we separated inside the forest trails both groups finding understory mixed flocks. The afternoon was a good opportunity to visit the Terra Firme forest, it was a relatively quiet afternoon with a close encounter with the Brasil Nut world. Overnight Manu Wildlife Center

May 14th

Another early morning departure to the Camungo Oxbow Lake, dividing the group in two so some were in the Kapok tree canopy platform and others were navigating the lake. Afterwards we switched activities. This day the activity concentrated in the first hours of the morning and then decayed due to the very hot weather, both groups enjoy different set of birds. Afternoon walk around the trail system having success with some forest specialties such as Rufous-tailed Flatbill and Semicollared Puffbird. Before dinner Gary gave us a small lecture about Bats and their diversity related to altitude. Overnight Manu Wildlife Center

May 15th

After breakfast we navigated for about fifteen minutes until we arrived to the beginning of the bamboo trail at Cocha Nueva. We went all together knowing that it was going to be a little bit difficult to bird in this habitat with a large group but after many days in the field we had accomplished a nice team work that allowed almost everybody to see the birds that were found. Some specialties of this day included Manu Antbird, Stiated Antbird and Black-spotted Bare-eyes. After lunch we took our boats again, but this time to reach another oxbow Lake, Cocha Blanco or White Lake was a perfect ending of this great

days in the lowland Rainforest adding to the mammal list some monkeys such as Squirrel Monkeys and Saddle-backed Tamarins. A great navigation around the lake brought a very close view of a Rufous-sided Crake tossing leaves very close to the lake margin and the last bird of the day was a Black-collared Hawk flying toward the catamaran as we approached the dock.
Overnight Manu Wildlife Center

May 16th

A long trip from Manu Wildlife Centre down through the Madre de Dios river leaving behind good memories of pristine forests brought us into the other face of the coin, gold mining towns appeared everywhere after two hours of navigation down stream. Very precarious towns with a lot of Black Vultures indicated the quality of the environment in these areas, a sad reality. After arriving to the port of Laberinto we took our vehicle straight to the city of Puerto Maldonado.

May 17th

Our last early departure towards the outskirts of Puerto Maldonado. Taking the road to Cusco we birded first behind the airport grounds adding some new species such as Yellow-headed Caracara and Southern Caracara. After this, our next spot was in a nearby palm swamp where everybody had great views of Point-tailed Palmcreepers. A deeper exploration of the man-made savannas gave an interesting set of birds. After this morning activity we drove to the airport and after some words of hope and farewell we took our flight ending a very nice overview of this part of the continent.

One individual heard at the Machu Picchu citadel on May 7th.

2. Undulated Tinamou *Crypturellus undulates*

Heard every day at Manu Wildlife Centre.

3. Bartlett's Tinamou *Crypturellus bartletti*

Heard every day at Manu Wildlife Centre.

4. White-tufted Grebe *Rollandia rolland*

Several individuals seen at Villa Marshes in the coast and some more seen at Huacarpay lake.

5. Peruvian Booby *Sula variegata*

Several individuals, seen fishing in San Pedro and Pucusana.

6. Neotropical Cormorant *Phalacrocorax brasilianus*

7. Guanay Cormorant *Phalacrocorax bouganvilli*

Several birds seen on the cliffs and caves behind Pucusana island the first day at the coast.

8. Red-legged Cormorant *Phalacrocorax gaimardii*

Several birds seen on the cliffs and caves behind Pucusana island the first day at the coast.

9. Anhinga *Anhinga anhinga*

Seen at Camungo lake, Cocha Blanco

10. Peruvian Pelican *Pelecanus thagus*

Several individuals seen fishing in San Pedro and Pucusana

11. Horned Screamer *Anhima cornuta*

Five individuals seen on the boat ride from Atalaya to MWC and four more at Camungo Lake

12. Andean Duck *Oxyura ferruginea*

Seen on the way to Pucusana at Villa Marshes and at Huacarpay Lake.

13. Orinoco Goose *Neochen jubata*
Conservation Status: Near-threatened
Several pairs were seen on the way to the Blanquillo Clay Lick on the Madre de Dios river. Everybody had good views.
14. Muscovy Duck *Cairina moschata*
Several individuals seen on the river rides around Manu Wildlife Center.
15. Torrent Duck *Merganetta armata*
Very common along the Urubamba river at Aguas Calientes.
16. Speckled Teal *Anas flavirostris*
Seen at Huacarpay lakes.
17. Yellow-billed Pintail *Anas georgica*
Three pairs seen at Huacarpay Lake on May 6th.
18. White-cheeked Pintail *Anas bahamensis*
Several seen at Villa Marshes and San Pedro fields.
19. Puna Teal *Anas puna*
Relatively common at Huacarpay lakes.
20. Cinnamon Teal *Anas cyanoptera*
Several pairs seen at Villa Marshes and Huacarpay lakes.
21. Little Blue Heron *Egretta caerulea*
One individual seen at San Pedro and another one at Huacarpay lakes. One was an immature
22. Snowy Egret *Egretta thula*
23. Capped Heron *Pilherodius pileatus*
Sixteen individuals counted along the Madre de Dios River.
24. Cooi Heron *Ardea cocoi*
Twenty four birds in total seen along the Rio Madre de Dios in the vicinity of MWC.
25. Great Egret *Casmerodius albus*
Common throughout the trip
26. Cattle Egret *Bubulcus ibis*
27. Striated Heron *Butorides striatus*
Individuals seen at Villa Marshes and on the way from Atalaya port to Manu Wildlife Centre.
28. Fasciated Tiger-Heron *Tigrisoma fasciatum*
Individuals seen along the Urubamba river downstream Aguas Calientes from the last bridge and on the way to MWC on the Upper Madre de Dios river
29. Rufescent Tiger-Heron *Tigrisoma lineatum*
Seen at Camungo lake.
30. Puna Ibis *Plegadis ridgwayi*
Common at Villa Marshes and Huacarpay lakes.
31. Andean Ibis *Theristicus branickii*
Two individuals seen by Mackenzie before the pass along the Manu Road.
32. Roseate Spoonbill *Ajaia ajaja*

Several seen along the Madre de Dios river banks.

33. Wood Stork *Mycteria Americana*

34. Black Vulture *Coragyps atratus*

Common throughout the tour.

35. Turkey Vulture *Cathartes aura*

Common throughout the tour.

36. Greater Yellow-headed Vulture *Cathartes melambrotus*

Common throughout the lowland section of the main tour.

37. King Vulture *Sarcoramphus papa*

Eight individuals seen in total around MWC and on the way back from Blanquillo Clay lick

38. Gray-headed Kite *Leptodon cayanensis*

One individual seen soaring from one of the boats on the way from MWC to Puerto Maldonado.

39. Swallow-tailed Kite *Elanoides forficatus*

Five individuals seen soaring above the Piñi-Piñi ridge from Atalaya meanwhile the boats were being loaded with our luggage.

40. White-tailed Kite *Elanus leucurus*

Two individuals seen mobbing a Southern Caracara on the road from Puerto M. to Cusco.

41. Crane Hawk *Geranospiza caerulescens*

One individual seen from one of the boats on the way from MWC to Puerto Maldonado on May 16th.

42. Slate-colored hawk *Leucopternis schistacea*

One bird seen along the trail system at MWC on May 15th.

43. Great-black Hawk *Buteogallus urubitinga*

Several seen on the margins of the Madre de Dios river in the lowlands.

44. Black-collared Hawk *Busarellus nigricollis*

A great view of one individual flying towards the catamaran at Cocha Blanco.

45. Black-chested Buzzard-Eagle *Geranoaetus melanoleucus*

Three seen soaring above Huacarpay Lake.

46. Roadside Hawk *Buteo magnirostris*

Common in the foothills and lowlands at Manu

47. Short-tailed Hawk *Buteo brachyurus*

One bird seen soaring from the catamaran at Camungo Lake.

48. White-tailed Hawk *Buteo albicaudatus*

One immature bird seen perched 20 kilometers from Puerto Maldonado via Cusco. Photographic evidence.

49. Zone-tailed Hawk *Buteo albonotatus*

One bird seen at Camungo lake.

50. Gray-lined Hawk *Asturina nitida*.

Two birds seen in the man-made savannas near Puerto Maldonado.

51. Black Hawk-Eagle *Spizaetus tyrannus*

One individual seen crossing Camungo lake.

52. Ornate Hawk-Eagle *Spizaetus ornatus*

One immature bird seen at Camungo Lake. Everybody had good views of this species.

53. Black Caracara *Daptrius ater*

Several seen along the lowland rivers.

54. Red-throated Caracara *Daptrius americanus*

Three birds seen in the trip.

55. Mountain Caracara *Phalcooboenus megalopterus*

Two individuals spotted by PJ near the second pass after Paucartambo and one more seen soaring above Acjanaco Pass.

56. Southern Crested Caracara *Caracara cheriway*

One bird seen near Puerto Maldonado on the pastures of Cedega.

57. Laughing Falcon *Herpetotheres cachinans*

One bird seen on the way from Atalaya to MWC. Two more near Puerto Maldonado.

58. American Kestrel *Falco sparverius*

Common at several locations during the tour

59. Bat Falcon *Falco rufigularis*

Ten birds seen in total throughout our time at Manu lowlands.

60. Speckled Chachalaca *Ortalis guttata*

Surprisingly only one individual seen on the lowlands of Manu.

61. Andean Guan *Penelope montagnii*

Several individuals seen near Rocotal

62. Blue-throated Piping Guan *Pipile cumanensis*

Three birds seen in total in the lowland section of the trip.

63. Rufous-sided Crake *Laterallus melanophaius*

One individual seen at Cocha Nueva.

64. Plumbeous Rail *Pardirallus sanguinolentus*

Several individuals seen at Huacarpay lakes.

65. Common Moorhen *Gallinula chloropus*

Common at Villa Marshes and Huacarpay lakes.

66. Andean Coot *Fulica ardesiaca*

Several seen at Villa Marshes and Huacarpay lakes.

67. Wattled Jacana *Jacana jacana*

Common at Cocha Blanco

68. Greater Yellowlegs *Tringa melanoleuca*

Several individuals seen along the coast at San Pedro beach and one more seen at Huacarpay lakes

69. Ruddy Turnstone *Arenaria interpres*

Some seen at San Pedro.

70. Willet *Catoptrophorus semipalmatus*

More than thirty birds seen at San Pedro.

71. Peruvian Thicknee *Burhinus superciliaris*

More than one hundred individuals seen in abandoned fields around Lurín. Incredible sighting!

72. Blackish Oystercatcher *Haematopus ater*
Two birds seen from the boat at Pucusana.
73. Black-necked Stilt *Himantopus mexicanus*
Several birds seen at San Pedro.
74. White-necked Stilt *Himantopus melanurus*
One seen at Huacarpay in the distance.
75. Collared Plover *Charadrius collaris*
Several individuals seen on the boat rides around MWC.
76. Pied Lapwing *Vanellus cayanus*
More than a dozen seen in total along the Madre de Dios river.
77. Andean Lapwing *Vanellus resplendens*
Several birds seen at Huancarani on the way to the pass.
78. Belcher's (Band-tailed) Gull *Larus belcheri*
Seen along the coast.
79. Gray Gull *Larus modestus*
Seen along the coast.
80. Kelp Gull *Larus dominicanus*
Seen along the coast.
81. Gray-headed Gull *Larus cirrocephalus*
Seen along the coast.
82. Andean Gull *Larus serranus*
Common throughout the highland section of the trip.
83. Franklin's Gull *Larus pipixcan*
Seen along the coast.
84. Large-billed Tern *Phaetusa simplex*
Seen along the Madre de Dios river around MWC.
85. Amazonian (Yellow-billed Tern) *Sterna superciliaris*
Seen along the Madre de Dios river around MWC.
86. Inca Tern *Larosterna Inca*
A beautiful bird! A cliff roost visited along the coast outside Pucusana.
87. Black Skimmer *Catharacta chilensis*
Several birds seen along the Madre de Dios river.
88. Scaled Pigeon *Patagioenas speciosa*
Three individuals seen in the pasturelands near Puerto Maldonado.
89. Spot-winged Pigeon *Columba maculosa*
Seen around the Cusco highlands.
90. Band-tailed Pigeon *Columba fasciata*
Several birds seen including a small flock close to the Acjanaco pass on the Manu road.
91. Pale-vented Pigeon *Columba cayennensis*
Several birds seen along the Madre de Dios river and at Cocha Camungo.

92. Plumbeous Pigeon *Columba plumbea*
Seen at CORL and near Puerto Maldonado.
93. Ruddy Pigeon *Columba subvinacea*
One bird seen from the tower at Cocha Camungo.
94. Eared Dove *Zenaida auriculata*
Birds seen at the coast, highlands and Aguas Calientes.
95. West Peruvian (Pacific) Dove *Zenaida meloda*
Common in the coastal section of the trip.
96. Ruddy Ground-Dove *Columbina tapalcoti*
Seen on fields around Puerto Maldonado.
97. Picui Ground-Dove *Columbina picui*
Austral migrant. Several seen near Puerto Maldonado
98. Croaking Ground-Dove *Columbina cruziana*
Seen around Lima.
99. Maroon-chested Ground-Dove *Claravis montedoura*
One male seen across the river from the Municipal Camp near Puente Ruinas.
100. White-tipped Dove *Leptotila verreauxi decipiens*
One bird seen around CORL.
101. Gray-fronted Dove *Leptotila rufaxilla*
One individual seen in total during our stay at MWC.
102. White-throated Quail-Dove *Geotrygon frenata*
One bird seen across the river from the Municipal Camp near Puente Ruinas.
103. Blue and Yellow Macaw *Ara ararauna*
Common at MWC.
104. Scarlet Macaw *Ara macao*
Common at MWC.
105. Red and Green Macaw *Ara chloropterus*
More than one hundred individuals seen at Blanquillo clay lick. Other birds seen flying by the Cochas.
106. Chestnut-fronted Macaw *Ara severa* Status
Few birds seen around MWC.
107. Red-bellied Macaw *Orthopsittaca (Ara)manilata*
Very well seen on the *Mauritia* Palm swamps near Puerto Maldonado.
108. Blue-headed Macaw *Primolius (Ara)couloni*
Status: Restricted range species, not globally threatened.
Two birds seen near the Blanquillo Clay-lick
109. Mitred Parakeet *Aratinga mitrata*
Seen around the Hotel in Lima.
110. White-eyed Parakeets *Aratinga leucophthalmus*
Common around MWC.
111. Dusky-headed Parakeet *Aratinga weddellii*
Common around MWC. Good views of nesting birds at Cocha Blanco.

112. Black-capped Parakeet *Pyrrhura rupicola*
A small flocks flew by rushing through the canopy below the tower at Cocha Camungo. We could´nt get good views.
113. Cobalt-winged Parakeet *Brotogeris cyanoptera*
Common at MWC.
114. Tui Parakeet *Brotogeris sanctithomae*
Some individuals seen around the MWC and at Cocha Camungo.
115. White-bellied Parrot *Pionites leucogaster*
Several individuals seen from the MWC canopy platform.
116. Orange-cheeked Parrot *Pionopsitta barrabandi*
Two birds seen at Camungo lake.
117. Blue-headed Parrot *Pionus menstruus*
Common around MWC.
118. Yellow-crowned Parrot *Amazona ochrocephala*
Only two pairs seen around MWC.
119. Scaly-naped Parrot *Amazona mercenaria*
Heard only along the Manu Road.
120. Mealy Parrot *Amazona farinose*
Common at MWC. More than ten individuals seen at the Blanquillo Clay-lick.
121. Squirrel Cuckoo *Piaya cayana*
Five birds seen in total throughout the lowland Rainforest section of the trip.
122. Little Cuckoo *Piaya minuta*
One bird at camungo Lake.
123. Hoatzin *Opisthocomus hoazin*
Common sighting in the bodies of water around MWC.
124. Smooth-billed Ani *Crotophaga ani*
Common along the rivers and fields near Puerto Maldonado.
125. Groove-billed Ani *Crotophaga sulcirostris*
Seen along the coast on the first day.
126. Rufescent Screech-Owl *Megascops ingens*
Great view of an individual by the cabins at CORL. No walking like gathering firewood if you want to see this one!
127. Tawny-bellied Screech-Owl *Megascops watsonii*
Heard only one night at MWC.
128. Magellanic Horned Owl *Bubo magellanicus*
One individual seen very well perched on *Eucaliptus* trees at Huancarani on the way to Paucartambo
129. Amazonian Pygmy-Owl *Glaucidium hardyi*
One individual seen from the Camungo Lake canopy platform by both groups.
130. Burrowing Owl *Speotyto cunicularia*
One bird seen at the fields around Lurin.

131. Sand-colored Nighthawk *Chordeiles rupestris*
More than two hundred individuals seen in total along the Madre de Dios river around MWC.
132. Band-winged Nightjar *Caprimulgus longirostris*
Two birds seen around Lima and from the train out of Cusco
133. Ladder-tailed Nightjar *Hydropsalis climacocerca*
One bird seen on the lake margin habitat at Cocha Blanco and another along the Madre de Dios river.
134. Lyre-tailed Nightjar *Uropsalis lyra*
Astonishing view of a perched male at the Manu road above CORL.
135. White-collared Swift *Streptoprocne zonaris*
Common throughout the Manu trip. A big "kettle" seen above Atalaya.
136. Pale-rumped Swift *Chaetura egregia*
Seen from the tower at Camungo lake and at MWC
137. Short-tailed Swift *Chaetura brachyura*
Seen well above the *Mauritia* swamp near Puerto Maldonado.
138. Neotropical Palm Swift *Tachornis squamata*
Birds seen at the *Mauritia* swamp near Puerto Maldonado.
139. Lesser-swallow-tailed Swift *Panyptila cayennensis*
One bird seen flying above MWC.
140. Green Hermit *Phaetornis guy*
Seen at CORL.
141. White-bearded Hermit *Phaethornis hispidus*
Seen twice at MWC, once by PJ.
142. Green Violetear *Colibri thalassinus*
One bird seen along the Manu Road.
143. Sparkling Violetear *Colibri coruscans*
Several individuals seen around Huacarpay lake area.
144. Fork-tailed Woodnymph *Thalurania furcata*
Several encounters with this sp around the gardens of MWC.
145. Golden-tailed Sapphire *Chrysuronia oenone*
One female seen from the canopy platform at Camungo lake.
146. Many-spotted Hummingbird *Taphrospilus hypostictus*
Seen daily coming to the feeders at CORL.
147. Green and White Hummingbird *Leucippus viridicauda*
Status: Endemic, not threatened.
Common bird at Machu Picchu.
148. Sapphire-spangled Emerald *Polyeratalactea*
One bird seen at the end of the bamboo trail at Cocha Nueva.
149. Amazilia Hummingbird *Amazilia amazilia*
Six birds at least seen the day at the pacific coast.
150. Speckled Hummingbird *Adelomyia melanogenys*

Seen at the Manu road and at Aguas Calientes.

151. Violet-fronted Brilliant *Heliodoxa leadbeateri*
Seen daily coming to the feeders at CORL.

152. Giant Hummingbird *Patagona gigas*
Four birds seen around Huacarpay lakes, good views of this giant.

153. Shining Sunbeam *Aglaeactis cupripennis*
One seen at Huancarani on the road to Paucartambo.

154. Great Sapphirewing *Pterophanes cyanopterus*
One bird seen near the Acjanaco pass on the Manu road.

155. Gould's Inca *Coeligena inca*
One adult seen around around the Machu Pichu town by the river.

156. Chestnut-breasted Coronet *Boissonneaua matthewsii*
One bird around the town of Machu Pichu.

157. Amethyst-throated Sunangel *Heliangels amethysticollis*
Common at the upper section of the Manu road and eastern slope of Abra Malaga.

158. Booted Raquet-tail *Ocreatus underwoodii*
Great view of a male at a feeder in CORL.

159. Green-tailed Trainbearer *Lesbia victoriae*
One individual seen on the road to Paucartambo.

160. Golden-headed Quetzal *Pharomachrus auriceps*
One individual seen first perched and then flew over us at the Manu road below CORL.

161. Pavonine Quetzal *Pharomachrus pavoninus*
Heard at MWC.

162. Black-tailed Trogon *Trogon melanurus*
Seen at MWC.

163. Collared Trogon *Trogon collaris*
Only two individuals seen during our time at MWC.

164. Blue-crowned Trogon *Trogon curucui*
Five birds seen in total during our time at MWC.

165. Amazonian Violaceous Trogon *Trogon violaceus*
One individual seen at the canopy platform at Camungo Lake.

166. Ringed Kingfisher *Ceryle torquata*
Common along the Madre de Dios river and at both Cochas.

167. Amazon Kingfisher *Chloroceryle amazona*
Several seen throughout the trip.

168. Green Kingfisher *Chloroceryle Americana*
Seen at both Cocha Comungo and Cocha Blanco

169. Broad-billed Motmot *Electron platyrhynchum*
Heard at MWC. One bird seen by Makenzie.

170. Blue-crowned Motmot *Momotus momota*

One bird seen on our walk to Cocha Blanco.

171. Highland Motmot *Momotus aequatorialis*
Eight birds seen in total along the Manu road around CORL.

172. Purus Jacamar *Galbalcyrhynchus purusianus*
Several seen at Cocha Camungo and Blanco. Two more seen near Puerto Maldonado.

173. Bluish-fronted Jacamar *Brachygalba albogularis*
Six birds seen in total during our time at MWC.

174. Semicollared Puffbird *Malacoptila semicineta*
Considered a regional endemic shared with the adjacent Acre state in Brasil and Pando in Bolivia. Two individuals seen one around Cocha Camungo and another one in an afternoon walk to the Grid.

175. Rufous-capped Nunlet *Nonnula ruficapilla*
Two individuals heard at the bamboo trail at Cocha Nueva.

176. Black-fronted Nunbird *Monasa nigrifrons*
Common at MWC.

177. Swallow-wing *Chelidoptera tenebrosa*
Common at river edge habitat canopy.

178. Gilded Barbet *Capito niger*
Heard only around MWC

179. Lemon-throated Barbet *Eubucco richardsoni*
Seen twice in the canopy around MWC.

180. Versicolored Barbet *Eubucco versicolor*
Seen around CORL. The male turned to be very difficult to see until finally some saw it.

181. Blue-banded Toucanet *Aulacorhynchus coeruleicinctis*
Great views of one bird above the CORL lek.

182. Brown-mandibled Aracari *Pteroglossus mariae*
Several birds seen at MWC working on the Cotinga tree by the river.

183. Chestnut-eared Aracari *Pteroglossus castanotis*
Common at MWC famous Cotinga tree.

184. Curl-crested Aracari *Pteroglossus beauharnaesii*
One individual seen around MWC.

185. Channel-billed (Yellow-ridged) Toucan *Ramphastos vitellinus*
Several individuals seen at Cocha Camungo and heard and seen many times around MWC.

186. Cuvier's (White-throated) Toucan *Ramphastos cuvieri (tucanus)*
More than ten birds seen around MWC.

187. Ocellated Piculet *Picumnus dorbignyanus*
One individual seen along the road that goes to Machu Pichu near the Puente Ruines.

188. Yellow-tufted Woodpecker *Melanerpes cruentatus*
Common in the lowlands of Manu.

189. Little Woodpecker *Veniliornis passerinus*
One bird seen at the island on the way to the Blanquillo Clay-Lick

190. Golden-Olive Woodpecker *Piculus rubiginosus*
One individual seen on the road to Puente Ruinas and the Macu Pichu ruins. Another near CORL
191. Scaly-breasted Woodpecker *Celeus grammicus*
Two individuals seen from the canopy platform at MWC.
192. Cream-coloured Woodpecker *Celeus flavus*
One bird perfectly seen from the Canopy platform at MWC.
193. Lineated Woodpecker *Dryocopus lineatus*
Seen at MWC.
194. Red-necked Woodpecker *Campephilus rubricollis*
Two individuals seen at Cocha Nueva at MWC.
195. Crimson-crested Woodpecker *Campephilus melanoleucos*
Seen several times at MWC.
196. Olivaceous Woodcreeper *Sittasomus griseicapillus*
Heard only at MWC.
197. Wedge-billed Woodcreeper *Glyphorhynchus spirurus*
One individual seen at MWC.
198. Cinnamon-throated Woodcreeper *Dendrexetastes rufigula*
One individual seen at eye level at the Camungo Lake canopy platform.
199. Strong-billed Woodcreeper *Xiphocolaptes promeropirhynchus*
One bird along the Manu road above CORL these might represent the montane race with different facial pattern and bill shape.
200. Amazonian Barred Woodcreeper *Dendrocolaptes certhia*
One bird seen with Silverio in the trail system at MWC.
201. Straight-billed Woodcreeper *Xiphorhynchus picus*
Close view of one individual in the surroundings of Puerto Maldonado.
202. Juriua (Elegant) Woodcreeper *Xiphorhynchus (elegans) juruanus*
Two birds seen in total at MWC. Now just split – wa Elegant now it's a regional endemic called Juriua Woodcreeper
203. Buff-throated Woodcreeper *Xiphorhynchus guttatus*
Common at MWC. Seen four times.
204. Olive-backed Woodcreeper *Xiphorhynchus triangularis*
One bird was found with a mixed species flock on the Manu road.
205. Montane Woodcreeper *Lepidocolaptes lacrymiger*
Two individuals seen near CORL on the Manu road.
206. Red-billed Scythebill *Campylorhamphus trochilirostris*
One individual seen near the army-ant raid at Cocha Nueva bamboo trail.
207. Peruvian Seaside (Surf) Cinclodes *Cinclodes taczanowskii*
Good views from the boat of a bird working in the intertidal strip at Pucusana.
208. Pale-legged Hornero *Furnarius leucopus*
Seen around the Blanquilo Clay-lick blind, specially when searching for a nice bush.
209. Puna Thistletail *Schizoeaca helleri*

One individual seen near Acjanaco pass on the Manu road

210. Azara's Spinetail *Synallaxis azarae*

Common along the upper section of the Manu road and around Aguas Calientes.

211. Dark-breasted Spinetail *Synallaxis albigularis*

One individual seen from the catamaran at Camungo lake.

212. Ash-browed Spinetail *Cranioleuca curtata*

Two individuals seen around CORL with Mixed species flocks.

213. Speckled Spinetail *Cranioleuca gutturata*

One bird seen foraging with a Mixed flock at MWC on the trail to the Terra Firme forest.

214. Rusty-fronted Canastero *Asthenes ottonis*

Status: Endemic, not threatened

One bird seen around the arid montane shrub at the edge of Huacarpay lakes.

215. Spotted Barbtail *Premnoplex brunnescens*

One bird seen below our feet level along the Manu road near the overlook.

216. Streaked Tuftedcheek *Pseudocolaptes boissonneautii*

Two birds seen with a mixed species flock foraging in mossy branches and bromeliads on the way to CORL.

217. Point-tailed Palmcreeper *Berlepschia rikeri*

Four individual seen in the Mauritia palm stands near Puerto Maldonado. Great views for everybody in the group. They even allowed scope views.

218. Montane Foliage-Gleaner *Anabacerthia striaticollis*

Two birds seen in total around CORL.

219. Chestnut-winged Foliage-Gleaner *Philydor erythropterus*

One bird seen very well amazingly perched on the bamboo at Cocha Nueva. A picture was taken.

220. Black-billed Treehunter *Thripadectes melanorhynchus*

One bird seen from the lodge deck at CORL.

221. Olive-backed Foliage-Gleaner *Automolus infuscatus*

Two birds seen along the trail system at MWC.

222. Black-tailed Leaf-tosser *Sclerurus caudacutus*

One individual seen but not well along the Toucan loop at MWC after it responded to playback.

223. Slender-billed Xenops *Xenops tenuirostris*

One individual seen along the Collpa trail at MWC.

224. Plain Xenops *Xenops minutus*

One bird seen foraging with a mixed flock along the Creekside trail at MWC.

225. Streaked Xenops *Xenops rutilans*

One individual seen around CORL and one more seen along the road to Puente Ruinas near Machu Pichu.

226. Fasciated Antshrike *Cymbilaimus lineatus*

One bird seen from the canopy platform at Camungo Lake.

227. Great Antshrike *Taraba major*

Two birds seen attending an Army-ant raid in the bamboo trail of Cocha Nueva.

228. Chestnut-backed Antshrike *Thamnophilus palliatus*
A pair seen from the deck at CORL.
229. Plain-winged Antshrike *Thamnophilus schistaceus*
Heard at MWC
230. Variable Antshrike *Thamnophilus caerulescens*
Two birds seen along the river near Puente Ruinas near machu Picchu.
231. Spot-winged Antshrike *Pygoptila stellaris*
Two birds seen two days in a row foraging with a mixed flock around MWC.
232. Bluish-Slate Antshrike *Thamnomanes schistogynus*
Common mixed flock leader seen at the Cocha Nueva bamboo trail at MWC.
233. Pygmy Antwren *Myrmotherula brachyura*
One bird seen at MWC foraging with a mixed flock.
234. Sclater's Antwren *Myrmotherula sclateri*
One individual seen high on the canopy foraging with a mixed flock from the Canopy platform at Camungo Lake.
235. Amazonian Streaked-Antwren *Myrmotherula surinamensis*
One male seen on the creek that can be seen on the way to the canopy platform at MWC.
236. Stripe-chested Antwren *Myrmotherula longicauda*
Two individuals seen at CORL from the dining room deck.
237. Plain-throated Antwren *Myrmotherula huxwelli*
Two birds seen along the trail system at MWC.
238. White-flanked Antwren *Myrmotherula axillaries*
One individual seen at MWC, they usually is a member of mixed flocks.
239. Striated Antbird *Drymophila devillei*
One bird seen in the Cocha Nueva bamboo stand.
240. Chestnut-shouldered Antwren *Terenura humeralis*
We consider this one heard only because we had an individual high above us on the trail returning from Cocha Nueva and only the guides saw it.
241. Manu Antbird *Cercromacra manu*
Four individuals seen after responding to playback at Cocha Nueva bamboo stand.
242. White-backed Fire-Eye *Pyriglena leuconota*
One individual heard at CORL.
243. White-browed Antbird *Myrmoborus leucophrys*
One male perched in front and we were able to put the scope and everybody in the group had great views of this handsome antbird.
244. Yellow-breasted Warbling Antbird *Hypocnemis subflava*
One bird seen in the Cocha Nueva bamboo stand attending an Army-ant raid. Note that warbling Antbird has just been divided into several different species – the one we saw was this
245. White-lined Antbird *Percnostola lophotes*
Status: Restricted-range species, not threatened.
Three birds seen at the Bamboo trail at Cocha Nueva.
246. Southern Chestnut-tailed Antbird *Myrmeciza hemimelaena*

An elusive bird that allowed only fast views as it moved through the lower parts of the forest.

247. Plumbeous Antbird *Myrmeciza hyperythra*

Seen on the way to Cocha Camungo and on a small *Heliconia* patch on the way to Cocha Blanco.

248. Goeldi's Antbird *Myrmeciza goeldii*

One pair seen in the Cocha Nueva bamboo stand attending an Army-ant raid. Good views of the female.

249. Black-spotted Bare-Eye *Phlegopsis nigromaculata*

Three individuals seen in the Cocha Nueva bamboo stand attending an Army-ant raid.

250. Rufous-capped Antthrush *Formicarius colma*

One individual came rushing to the tape and perched one afternoon at the Grid near MWC.

251. Black-faced Antthrush *Formicarius analis*

Heard only.

252. Red-and-White Antpitta *Grallaria erythroleuca*

Status: Endemic, not threatened.

Heard only along the middle sections of the Manu Road.

253. Rusty-belted Tapaculo *Liosceles thoracicus*

Heard only several times but never responded to the tape.

254. Northern White-crowned Tapaculo *Scytalopus atratus*

Heard along the road above CORL.

255. Screaming Piha *Lipaugus vociferans*

Heard several times at MWC.

256. Purple-throated Cotinga *Porphyrolaema porphyrolaema*

One male seen perched on the Cotinga tree at the MWC clearing

257. Plum-throated Cotinga *Cotinga maynana*

One male seen three days in a row at the famous Cotinga tree.

258. Spangled Cotinga *Cotinga cayana*

Seen at the Cotinga tree.

259. Bare-necked Fruitcrow *Gymnoderus foetidus*

Two individuals seen in total on different days. The first individual of the trip was a female seen from the Canopy platform at MWC.

260. Purple-throated Fruitcrow *Querula purpurata*

Seen on the way to Camungo lake.

261. Andean Cock-of-the-Rock *Rupicola peruviana satura*

A slow morning at the Lek due to the cold front but several males were seen in the vicinity.

262. Band-tailed Manakin *Pipra fasciicauda*

One female seen around the grounds at MWC.

263. Yungas Manakin *Chiroxiphia boliviana*

A spectacular male came several times to the feeder at CORL.

264. Wing-barred Piprites *Piprites chloris*

One individual seen foraging with a mixed flock at MWC.

265. Streak-necked Flycatcher *Mionectes striaticollis*

Two seen around CORL.

266. Sepia-capped Flycatcher *Leptopogon amaurocephalus*
One bird seen in the garden surrounding MWC.

267. Slaty-capped Flycatcher *Leptopogon suprcillaris*
Two individuals seen in total, one at Aguas Calientes and one at CORL.

268. White-bellied Tody-Tyrant *Hemitriccus griseipectus*
Heard only at MWC.

269. Sclater's Tyrannulet *Phyllomyias sclateri*
Two birds seen around Puente Ruinas near the Machu Picchu ruins.

270. Ashy-headed Tyrannulet *Phyllomyias cinereiceps*
Three birds seen around Puente Ruinas near the Machu Picchu ruins.

271. Bolivian Tyrannulet *Zimmerius bolivianus*
Two individuals seen around CORL.

272. Yellow-crowned Tyrannulet *Tyrannulus elatus*
One bird seen at the MWC clearing.

273. Forest Elaenia *Myiopagis gaimardii*
Heard only at MWC.

274. White-crested Elaenia *Elaenia albiceps*
Two seen at Huacarpay lake.

275. White-banded Tyrannulet *Mecocerculus stictopterus*
Seen along the Manu road foraging with mixed flocks below.

276. Torrent Tyrannulet *Serpophaga cinerea*
Eight seen in the Urubamba river and at Paucartambo.

277. River Tyrannulet *Serpophaga hypoleuca*
One bird seen very well from the Blanquillo clay-lick blind.

278. Yellow-billed Tit-Tyrant *Anairetes flavirostris*
One bird seen at Huacarpay.

279. Many-coloured Rush-Tyrant *Tachuris rubrigastra*
Seen at Huacarpay lakes.

280. Marble-faced Bristle-Tyrant *Phylloscartes ophthalmicus*
Two birds seen in total at CORL

281. Cinnamon-faced Tyrannulet *Phylloscartes parkeri*
One bird seen well at eye level from the deck at CORL, it was a moment to remember Ted Parker!

282. Mottle-cheeked Tyrannulet *Phylloscartes ventralis*
One individual seen around Puente Ruinas near the Machu Picchu ruins.

283. Scale-crested Pygmy-Tyrant *Lophotriccus pileatus*
Frequently heard but only seen twice around CORL along the Manu road.

284. Rufous-tailed Flatbill *Ramphotricon ruficauda*
One individual seen at the Grid.

285. Zimmers Tolmomyas (Yellow-margined Flycatcher) *Tolmomyias assimilis*

Heard only at MWC.

286. Cinnamon Flycatcher *Pyrrhomyias cinnamomea*
One individual seen around Puente Ruinas near the Machu Picchu ruins.

287. Eulers Flycatcher *Lathrotriccus euleri*
Leader-only bird seen at HAL.

288. Olive-sided Flycatcher *Mitrephanes olivaceous*
Two birds seen along the lower section of the Manu road between CORL and Quitacalzon.

289. Smoke-coloured Pewee *Contopus fumigatus*
One bird seen in total along the Manu road above CORL.

290. Black Phoebe *Sayornis nigricans*
Common

291. Vermillion Flycatcher *Pyrocephalus rubinus*
Common including the patagonian race with females having a different color at the lower flanks, yellowish and sometimes almost not present.

292. Maroon-belted Chat-Tyrant *Ochthoeca cinnamomeiventris*
One bird seen after below Pillahuata along the Manu road. Sometimes called the Chestnut-belted Chat-Tyrant.

293. Brown-backed Chat-Tyrant *Ochthoeca fumicolor*
One bird at the Acjanaco pass guard station.

294. White-browed Chat-Tyrant *Ochthoeca leucophrys*
Seen at Huacarpay and Huancarani on Arid montane scrub habitat.

295. Drab Water-Tyrant *Ochthornis littoralis*
Common along the Madre de Dios river.

296. Spot-billed Ground-Tyrant *Muscisaxicola maculirostris*
Two birds seen at Huacarpay near the pre-inca ruins.

297. Little Ground-Tyrant *Muscisaxicola fluviatilis*
Two individuals seen from the Blanquillo clay-lick blind in the sucesional habitat.

298. Andean Negrito *Lessonia oreas*
One male seen at Huacarpay.

299. White-winged Black-Tyrant *Knipolegus aterrimus*
One female seen perched around the Machu Pichu ruins.

300. White-eyed Attila *Attila bolivianus*
One individual seen around the MWC grounds.

301. Dusky-capped Flycatcher *Myiarchus tuberculifer*
One bird seen from the deck at CORL following a mixed flock.

302. Swainson's Flycatcher *Myiarchus swainsoni*
One individual seen from the canopy platform at Camungo Lake.

303. Short-crested Flycatcher *Myiarchus ferox*
Seen around the clay lick and at Camungo lake.

304. Tropical Kingbird *Tyrannus melancholicus*
Common. The famous TK.

305. Crowned Slaty Flycatcher *Griseotyrannus aurantioatocristatus*
Seen almost everyday perched on top of a palm frond around MWC. Southern (Austral) migrant

306. Boat-billed Flycatcher *Megarynchus pitangua*
One bird seen at the island where Blanquillo Clay-lick is located.

307. Lemon-browed Flycatcher *Conopias cinchoneti*
Two individuals seen at the entrance of CORL.

308. Golden-crowned Flycatcher *Myiodynastes chrysocephalus*
Two birds seen very well along the Urubamba river at the Machu Picchu buses repair center.

309. Social Flycatcher *Myiozetetes similis*
Common throughout the Manu lowlands section of the trip.

310. Gray-capped Flycatcher *Myiozetetes granadensis*
Seen almost everyday around MWC's bar porche.

311. Lesser Kiskadee *Philohydor lector*
Three birds seen at the Cochas.

312. Great Kiskadee *Pitangus sulphuratus*
Several seen specially near Puerto Maldonado.

313. Barred Becard *Pachyramphus versicolor*
Several seen around Machu Picchu and along the Manu road.

314. Pink-throated Becard *Pachyramphus minor*
One male seen from the canopy platform at Camungo lake and a female seen the next day at the bamboo trail.

315. Black-tailed Tityra *Tityra cayana*
One individual seen perched on the Cotinga tree at MWC

316. Masked Tityra *Tityra semifasciata*
Two birds seen seen perched on the Cotinga tree at MWC.

317. White-collared Jay *Cyanoyca viridicyana*
Six birds seen along the Manu road, going from Acajanaco to CORL.

318. Purplish Jay *Cyanocorax cyanomelas*
Common throughout the Manu lowlands section of the trip.

319. Violaceous Jay *Cyanocorax violaceus*
Common in the lowlands.

320. Inca Jay *Cyanocorax yncas*
Three individuals seen near the lek at CORL.

321. Red-eyed Vireo *Vireo olivaceus*
Seen at several locations.

322. Brown-capped Vireo *Vireo leucophrys*
One individual seen along the Manu road above CORL. Four more seen around Aguas Calientes.

323. Dusky-capped Greenlet *Hylophilus hypoxanthus*
One bird seen along Creekside trail at MWC.

324. White-capped Dipper *Cinclus leucocephalus*

Two in total seen around Aguas Calientes along the Urubamba river.

325. Andean Solitaire *Myadestes ralloides*

One bird seen along the manu road near the overlook.

326. Chiguanco Thrush *Turdus chiguanco*

Common in the highlands.

327. Great Thrush *Turdus fuscater*

Several seen in the upper sections of the Manu road.

328. Black-billed Thrush *Turdus ignobilis*

One bird seen near the Blanquillo clay-lick

329. White-necked Thrush *Turdus albicollis*

One individual seen at MWC.

330. Inca Wren *Thryothorus eisenmanni*

Status: Endemic, not threatened. Described in 1985

Two birds seen near the entrance of the Machu Pichu Ruins. A very helpful bird that allowed everybody great eye-level detailed views.

331. Moustached Wren *Thryothorus genibarbis*

Seen once but very difficult through dense understory near Camungo lake.

332. Southern House Wren *Troglodytes aedon*

Common.

333. Mountain Wren *Troglodytes solstitialis*

Four birds seen around the tunnels along the Manu road. Three more seen on the Eastern slope at Abra Malaga.

334. Grey-breasted Wood-Wren *Henicorhina leucophrys*

One seen along the Manu road around CORL.

335. Black-capped Donacobius *Donacobius atricapillus*

Common at the bodies of water in the Manu lowlands.

336. White-winged Swallow *Tachycineta albiventer*

Common along the Madre de Dios river.

337. Brown-chested Martin *Phaeoprogne tapera*

Seen along the Madre de Dios river on the way to the Cochas.

338. Brown-bellied Swallow *Notiochelidon murina*

Seen at Huacarpay and Paucartambo.

339. Blue-and-white Swallow *Notiochelidon cyanoleuca*

Common

340. White-banded Swallow *Atticora fasciata*

Common along Madre de Dios river.

341. Southern Rough-winged Swallow *Stelgidopteryx ruficollis*

Common

342. House Sparrow *Passer domesticus*

Several seen the first day along the coast and in Lima.

343. Hooded Siskin *Carduelis magellanica*

Not many seen on the way from cusco to CORL.

344. Tropical Parula *Parula pitiayumi*
Common around CORL and Aguas Calientes

345. Slate-throated Whitestart *Myioborus miniatus*
Common

346. Spectacled Whitestart *Myioborus melanocephalus*
Common but only two birds seen in total.

347. Three-striped Warbler *Basileuterus tristatus*
Two individuals seen around CORL.

348. Rufous-collared Sparrow *Zonotrichia capensis*
Nicely patterned sparrow. No more comments of this friend!!

349. Yellow-browed Sparrow *Ammodramus aurifrons*
Seen around Puerto Maldonado.

350. Black-faced Brush Finch *Atlapetes melanolaemus*
Relatively common from Pillahuata down to CORL

351. Tricolored Brush Finch *Atlapetes tricolor*
Three birds seen near the Machu Picchu ruins when searching for the Inca wren.

352. Red-capped Cardinal *Paroaria gularis*
Common at the bodies of water around MWC.

353. Bananaquit *Coereba flaveola*
One individual seen around CORL.

354. White-browed Conebill *Conirostrum ferrugineiventris*
Two birds seen foraging with a mixed flock at Acjanaco at the entrance to Manu road.

355. Capped Conebill *Conirostrum albifrons*
Two pairs seen near Aguas Calientes.

356. Magpie Tanager *Lamprospiza melanoleuca*
Seen near Camungo Lake and Puerto Maldonado.

357. Common Bush-Tanager *Chlorospingus ophthalmicus*
Two birds seen in total near Machu Picchu..

358. Yellow-throated Bush-Tanager *Chlorospingus flavigularis*
Seen at Aguas Calientes and common at CORL.

359. Superciliaried Hemispingus *Hemispingus superciliaris*
One bird seen along the Manu road below Pillahuata tunnels.

360. Black-eared Hemispingus *Hemispingus melanotis*
Five individuals seen in total from the deck at CORL.

361. Rust-and-yellow Tanager *Thlypopsis ruficeps*
Two individuals seen around Machu Picchu ruins.

362. White-winged Shrike-Tanager *Lanio versicolor*
Two individuals seen twice leading a mixed flock along the trail system at MWC.

363. White-shouldered Tanager *Tachyphonus luctuosus*

Two birds seen from the canopy platform at Camungo lake.

364. Red-crowned Ant-Tanager *Habia rubica*
Common at MWC

365. Highland Hepatic Tanager *Piranga flava*
Two individuals seen around Machu Picchu ruins.

366. Masked Crimson Tanager *Ramphocelus nigrogularis*
Six birds seen also at Camungo lake.

367. Silver-beaked Tanager *Ramphocelus carbo*
Common

368. Blue-Grey Tanager *Thraupis episcopus*
Common

369. Palm Tanager *Thraupis palmarum*
Common

370. Blue-capped Tanager *Thraupis cyanocephala*
Three individuals seen around Machu Picchu ruins.

371. Scarlet-bellied Mountain Tanager *Anisognathus igniventris*
One bird seen along the Manu road.

372. Yellow-throated Tanager *Iridosornis analis*
One bird seen many times close to CORL.

373. Golden collared Tanager *Iridosornis jelskii*
Three birds seen around the Elfin forest Camp site along the Manu road

374. Fawn-breasted Tanager *Pipraeidea melanonota*
Two birds seen around Aguas calientes.

375. White-lored Euphonia *Euphonia chrysopasta*
Common

376. Orange-bellied Euphonia *Euphonia xanthogaster*
Common

377. Rufous-bellied Euphonia *Euphonia rufiventris*
Two birds around MWC.

378. Orange-eared Tanager *Chlorochrysa calliparaea*
Five individuals seen around CORL.

379. Turquoise Tanager *Tangara mexicana*
Seen along the lowland section of the trip at MWC.

380. Paradise Tanager *Tangara chilensis*
Common.

381. Green and Gold Tanager *Tangara schrankii*
Common.

382. Golden Tanager *Tangara arthus*
Several individuals seen around CORL.

383. Saffron-crowned Tanager *Tangara xanthocephala*

Seen around CORL.

384. Flame-faced Tanager *Tangara parzudakii*
One individual seen above the overlook at CORL.

385. Spotted Tanager *Tangara punctata*
Four birds seen at CORL

386. Bay-headed Tanager *Tangara gyrola*
One bird seen around CORL.

387. Blue-necked Tanager *Tangara cyanicollis*
Common

388. Beryl-spangled Tanager *Tangara nigroviridis*
Eight birds seen around CORL.

389. Opal-rumped Tanager *Tangara velia*
Three individuals seen from the canopy platform at Cocha Camungo.

390. Opal-crowned Tanager *Tangara callophrys*
Four individuals seen from the canopy platform at Cocha Camungo.

391. Black-faced Dacnis *Dacnis lineata*
Two birds seen at MWC.

392. Yellow-bellied Dacnis *Dacnis flaviventer*
Seen twice. One male bird was spotted with the scope perched on a bare branch on the big tree at MWC.

393. Blue Dacnis *Dacnis cayana*
Common. Seen several times at MWC.

394. Green Honeycreeper *Chlorophanes spiza*
One male seen from the canopy platform at Cocha Camungo

395. Swallow Tanager *Tersina viridis*
Interesting sight with more than fifteen birds flocking together and always found perched on a big tree at MWC..

396. Peruvian Sierra-Finch *Phrygilus punensis*
One individual seen at Huancarani.

397. Mourning Sierra Finch *Phrygilus fruticeti*
Seen at Huacarpay lake and Huancarani.

398. Ash-breasted Sierra Finch *Phrygilus plebejus*
One individual seen at Huancarani.

399. Chestnut-breasted Mountain-Finch *Poospiza caeser*
Status: Endemic, not threatened
Three birds very well seen at Huancarani along the Manu road.

400. Greenish Yellow-Finch *Sicalis olivascens*
Several individuals seen foraging on arid montane scrub habitat at Huacarpay lakes

401. Grassland Yellow-Finch *Sicalis luteola*
Seen at San Pedro fields near Lima.

402. Yellow-bellied Seedeater *Sporophila nigricollis*
One bird seen near Machu Picchu ruins.
403. Chestnut-bellied Seedeater *Sporophila castaneiventris*
One bird seen near the port of Atalaya.
404. Band-tailed Seedeater *Catamenia analis*
Common in the highlands.
405. Moustached Flower-Piercer *Diglossa mystacalis*
Seen at the Elfin forest habitat along the Manu road.
406. Black-throated Flower-Piercer *Diglossa brunneiventris*
Four birds seen at Huancarani along the Manu road.
407. Golden-eyed Flower-Piercer *Diglossopsis glauca*
One individual seen around CORL.
408. Masked Flower-Piercer *Diglossopsis cyanea*
Two birds seen along the Manu road near the Acjanaco pass.
409. Buff-throated Saltator *Saltator maximus*
Common at MWC.
410. Greyish Saltator *Saltator coerulescens*
One bird seen at Camungo oxbow lake.
411. Golden-billed Saltator *Saltator aurantiirostris*
One seen on the first section of the Manu road before Paucartambo.
412. Casqued Oropendola *Psarocolius oseryi*
One seen one afternoon at the Grid trails at MWC.
413. Crested Oropendola *Psarocolius decunus*
Common.
414. Dusky-green Oropendola *Psarocolius atrovirens*
Two birds seen near CORL.
415. Russet-backed Oropendola *Psarocolius angustifrons*
Common
416. Amazonian Oropendola *Gymnostinops bifasciatus*
Several birds seen around MWC.
417. Yellow-rumped Cacique *Cacicus cela*
Common
418. Epaulet Oriole *Icterus cayanensis*
One individual seen at the MWC trail system.
419. Orange-backed Troupial *Icterus icterus*
One bird seen at Camungo lake canopy platform.
420. Pale-eyed Blackbird *Agelaius xanthophthalmus*
Status: Restricted range species, near-threatened.
Two birds seen very well at Camungo lake.
421. Yellow-winged Blackbird *Agelaius thilius*
Seen at Huacarapay lakes

422. Shiny Cowbird *Molothrus bonaerensis*
One bird seen at the Hotel in Lima.

423. Giant Cowbird *Scaphidura oryzivora*
Common along the Madre de Dios river.
